

Creating a sustainable institutional environment for academic integrity: Alignment across quadrants is key



1. Strategy and culture: strategic priority, with clear, aligned and regularly reviewed policies and procedures; Monitoring and reporting



2. Training and support for staff and students: Academic integrity embedded into staff roles, induction, performance appraisals and culture

3. Curriculum: Tasks designed to engage and affirm learning; Culture of personalised learning and relationships; Authentic tasks linked to future needs, and motivation



4. Technology: Online resources and guides available 'just-in-time'; Software for text matching; Whole-of-institution record keeping and reporting
